Everything was very clear, not even leaving any questions. The topics chosen for School are not just interesting, but actually important and very useful. However, during the course of School, more time could have been given for lectures and workshops on Multidisciplinary methods: if the introduction part had been put in one day instead of to first days we would have had more time to work on actual research tools.

The stay at Dębina Palace was also a very pleasant experience with nice rooms, beautiful territory, a lot of places to share and a very good kitchen. I think it is a perfect place for this kind of event, as well as for a family holiday or wedding or anything else.

Personally, I liked going to the university for lessons every day, it wasn't as exhausting as everyone expected, instead, we got to spend time on campus, meet more people and get the material in well-prepared spaces (talking about simple areas as well as laboratories).

The biggest suggestion I have for the future perfecting of the program organization is to add some simple steps - kind of requiring a motivation letter when accepting students to the School.
